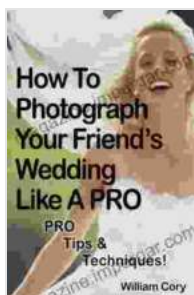

1. Before the Wedding

- Meet with the couple

- Respect the couple's wishes



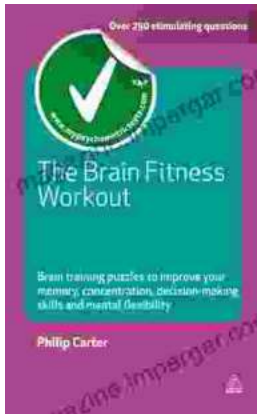
